#### **Summary of Findings**

### New York Regulations and OCFS Guidance:

- There is no state mandate for childcare centers to close
- School districts are required to submit a plan for childcare for essential workers
- Background checks recently relaxed (OCFS working on guidance, should have out by 3/20); also working on guidance for hospitals, universities, and colleges
- OCFS spoke with Broome Co. to explore "drop-in" childcare; OCFS working on guidance now
- Emergency changes in regulations found on the OCFS website

#### **Approaches:**

- NY Counties
  - o Varied responses to Governor's orders to create plans for childcare
    - Keeping existing centers open
    - Opening new centers via community organizations
    - Coordinating with Cooperative Extension
  - Live-updated news source focused on childcare state announcements: https://childcarerockland.org/what\_we\_do/covid-19-updates.html
- States
  - No consistent approach across states
  - All approaches are so new (many went into effect 3/18), there is no evidence for effectiveness or comparison as to which approach is best
  - Approaches include:
    - Governor Executive Orders
      - Lift or waive usual childcare regulations (e.g., staffing, classroom sizes)
      - Mandate school districts provide childcare
      - Rarely provide funding to support the efforts
    - State-funded childcares remain open
    - Locally-lead response
      - YMCA's are taking the lead in offering services in lieu of usual gym operations
      - Other approaches include community centers, libraries, and faith communities
  - No approaches explicitly address challenges for parents who work a nightshift or third shift.

#### Recommendations

- Create an easily-accessible, central website for information for families looking for care or childcare workers looking to help (Colorado's <u>example</u>). This may be easier to monitor/collect large amounts of information compared to a phone line, which is another option.
- Encourage childcares that do stay open to apply for waivers from OCFS to remain open 24hrs to support off-shift workers.
- If interested in drop-in centers, consider reaching out to Broome County who have spoken with OCFS on this matter (OCFS currently is working on guidance for this type of care).
